From the Desk of Fr. Bart

Eighth Sunday of Ordinary Time

Jesus lived in an agrarian culture where people tilled the soil to provide for themselves and their families. In today's Gospel he uses a metaphor that his audience would immediately have understood: "A good tree does not bear rotten fruit, nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit. For every tree is known by its own fruit." We might ask, what "fruit" do we bear that marks us as Catholic Christians?

Plan for a Holy Lent!

Please pray about how you will engage in the Season of Lent this year. Please see page 3 for our Ash Wednesday Mass Schedule and the Lenten guidelines on fasting and abstinence. I have been praying about the theme for us to focus on as we journey together this Lent. At this moment I want to use the theme: "Come, Holy Spirit, Lead Us to Easter Renewal!" What are the things, what are the ways, and who are the people who lead us to Resurrection and New Life? We need to engage the graces and blessings God has given us that lead us to Easter and rid our lives of whatever leads us away from the resurrection to final death. Let's have a beautiful renewal of our love for Jesus in these holy days of Lent!

Front Doors of Church and Education Wing

We have ten doors in the front of our Gathering Area and Education Wing. These doors are at the end of their useful lives. The inside mechanisms that lock the doors are worn out and the company no longer services them, nor are parts still made to replace them. Also the doors are sagging from the hinges. This has caused numerous security issues. There have been nights when the doors had to be tied closed with rope because we couldn't get them to lock. There have been nights when the last person to leave the building did not double check that the doors were closed and strangers have walked right into the building. We have this on video surveillance and have called the police who have been very helpful tracking down one trespasser in particular. Because of the bad hinges, the automatic locking doors do not close all the way, thus leaving the building open and vulnerable. We even have stopped using certain doors because we are afraid that we won't be able to re-lock them. It has been difficult to train all of the people who leave the building at night to double check the doors and so we even had to put up a sign on the most broken door and ask people not to use it.

We cannot wait to have a fundraiser to correct this situation due to the fact that we need to keep the students and children safe who are using the education wing during the daytime and evening. We also cannot allow our property to be exposed to trespassers, invaders, or those who partake in criminal behavior.

Thank you to our Maintenance Director, Ismael Covarrubias, for making these doors last so long and for coming back into work at night to get them locked when they were broken. He has kept them working as long as possible, and it is now time to replace the doors and keep our property secure. Of course this is expensive and was not included in this year's annual budget. The total cost of the project to replace the doors is \$55,000. To pay for the doors, we have decided to decrease our Outreach Funding by \$11,000, use \$15,000 of our Memorial Fund, and borrow \$29,000 from Capital Bank. We will repay this short-term loan next year with the income we receive from the annual income from the Cell Phone Towers on top of our Church roof, which totals \$30,000 annually.

We did have two companies who offered us bids on the project, and we went with the lower of the two bids. The new doors will be installed soon. They will be larger and will lock to a bar that is perpendicular

Why a Lenten Creation Care Fast?

Our collective consumption patterns have a significant impact on our environment.

Week One: Limit meat consumption. Meat production accounts for about 15% of climate warming greenhouse gas emissions. Cutting back goes a long way toward helping the environment and can improve your health. When eating meat, chicken production generates only 1/4 of the global warming emissions of beef and lamb production. Consider adding a meatless Monday? Wednesday? Try to eat poultry instead of red meat.

Penitential Disciplines of Lent

The Christian faithful, during Lent, are clearly conscious of the need to turn the mind towards those realities which really count, which require Gospel commitment and integrity of life which, through self denial of those things which are superfluous, are translated into good works and solidarity with the poor and needy (Directory on Popular Piety and the Liturgy, #125).

In addition to choosing their own penitential practices, Catholics are also asked to observe the practices of fast and abstinence during the 40 days of Lent. The Lenten Fast and Abstinence Regulations are as follows:

1. Everyone 14 years of age or over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.
2. Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 years of age is bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
3. On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other smaller meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.
4. Catholics should not lightly excuse themselves from these prescribed minimal penitential practices.

between the doors instead of locking into the bottom of the door frame. This will help the doors last longer, as salt and slush will not rust the locking mechanisms like what happened to our current doors.

Financial Update

As of the end of January 2019, you have probably noticed that we are behind in meeting our projected budgeted income for our current fiscal year. Compared to our total projected income, we are \$50,000 behind. However, I am happy to report that our expenses up to this point of January 2019 are about \$40,000 less than what we projected, due to careful spending and cutting back on expenses. One example of this was our recent attempt to educate people and promote the *Catholic Herald* subscriptions, which positively affected our financial situation. So, that means that we are about \$10,000 away from breaking even.

I am concerned about this challenge that we face in paying our bills. We have discussed this situation among our STA Staff and with our Finance Council and I was asked to share this update with the parish. The Finance Council hoped that by sharing our needs with the faithful, our members would respond positively through generous support. Every gift, no matter how large or how small, makes a big difference. For example, if 500 families offered an extra \$20 we would make up the current negative balance between our income and expenses. The bad winter weather has also taken a toll on our expenses for snow removal and keeping attendance lower, so less has been given in our Sunday Offertory. I appreciate all that you do to help our mission here at STA and your tremendous generosity!

Thank You for Your Support of the Annual Catholic Appeal (ACA)!

Lastly, I want to thank all of you for your generous response today to our ACA in-pew pledge weekend and all who gave through the mail. The Diocese has changed their policy for parishes like ours, who traditionally go over the parish goal by allowing over-goal sharing funds back to the parish if the diocesan total of \$3.5 Million is reached. I am anxious to see how this will affect our parish, and I hope that we will be able to receive some of the funds back that we collect during the ACA to help further our mission here at STA.

Parish Outreach Funding

Each year, the parish budget includes an amount of money that will be directed towards parish outreach. The Outreach Funding Review Board examines requests for funds from a variety of service organizations and helps to discern how to share this parish financial outreach to help our neighbors in need. A faith filled discernment with an open and careful discussion among the board members is used to reach consensus for funding. Recommendations for which organizations to fund and the suggested amount for each is then forwarded to the Pastoral Council and to Fr. Bart.

The following criteria are followed when considering funding:

- a parish member must serve as an advocate for the organization
- the organization must formally request funds through the advocate
- the request must be for a specific amount and address an explicit need
- recipients will be balanced between diverse groups-local community/national/global, young/aging, multiple cultures/minorities/ethnic groups
- there should be the possibility of involvement for the entire parish

The amounts for the 2018-2019 fiscal year, which will be distributed during March, will be as follows:

- \$10,000 to St. Thomas Aquinas Conference of St. Vincent de Paul for assistance to families referred to our conference and visited in home visits. This assistance falls into four main categories for support: Housing, utilities, transportation and food/clothing/other.
- \$5,000 to Catholic Multicultural Center for their expanded free meal program that offers meals seven days a week and for immigration legal help for low income immigrants and refugees.
- \$2,700 to Lussier Community Education Center for half of the cost to provide one "seat" of elementary afterschool programming for one person for the school year
- \$500 to Catholic Charities to provide approximately five months of music programming
- \$575 to Women's Care Center for Understanding Pregnancy Video series and baby equipment.
- \$625 to Care Net for ultrasound maintenance for the clinic
- \$575 to Pregnancy Helpline for the purchase of Pack N Plays for their Safe Sleep Program.

Where Did All the Money Go?

Almost 5 years ago, our diocese conducted a Capital Campaign to establish an endowment to fund the Diocese of Madison's seminarian education. Our parish goal was \$830,000.00. Thanks to the 350 households who participated in the campaign, we almost doubled our goal by pledging \$1,539,477.00. Entering this 5th and final year of the campaign, our parish is only \$197,311.00 from reaching our pledge goal!

The diocese gave each parish the incentive of receiving money back (Over Goal Sharing) if their parishioners pledged and contributed to the campaign above and beyond our goal. So far, we have received \$343,364.05 in Over Goal Sharing which, as we promised, has gone to fund capital expenditures. So, where has all the money gone? We had to purchase a boiler right before the winter of 2015-16. If we hadn't, you would have been sitting in a very cold church. The boiler cost us \$118,837.00. The city required us to make some curb inlet repairs, which cost \$9,658.32. A new roof was put on the duplex rectory and it also received some very necessary new siding which cost \$47,259.00. To accommodate the support staff and growing number of volunteers, the workroom was remodeled which cost \$22,115.84. Finally, we put new lighting in the Sanctuary and Church, which cost \$180,959.74. The grand total of our capital improvements is \$372,293.95. That means we have spent \$28,929.90 over what we have received from Over Goal Sharing. Please fulfill your pledge so we can receive our final Over Goal Sharing amount! As we enter the Lenten Season, I encourage each of you to make a renewed commitment to truly praying the Mass. We can easily get into the routine of going through the motions, and not really thinking about what we are doing when we come to pray. I encourage each of you to really consider and pray the texts that we sing. Whether or not you consider yourself a singer, as an active participant at Mass, it's important to pray the texts that we sing! These songs that we sing are all about the text. This is a very real part of our prayer. Join us in opening your heart during this season of prayer.

Each weekend during our Lenten Season, we will begin our celebration by singing:

Return to God with all your heart. Surrender and be free.
With humble hearts we cry to you: have mercy on us Lord;
Forgive our sin, we pray, we pray.

We then come to God in the Penitential Rite and pray together the Kyrie Eleison (Lord, have mercy) in Greek.

Lord Jesus, you make us a new people. Kyrie Eleison (Lord Have Mercy).

Lord Jesus, you speak your Father's word and we are free.

Christe Eleison (Christ Have Mercy).

Lord Jesus, you raise your hand and we are healed. Kyrie Eleison (Lord Have Mercy).

During our Universal Prayer (General Intercessions/Petitions), we raise our response to each petition in sung prayer.

Te Rogamos, Óyenos; Lord, Hear our Prayer.

In addition, we will sing the Mass of Charity and Love by Steven Warner. This setting of the Ordinary of the Mass is based upon the chant "Where Charity and Love Prevail" by Paul Benoit, OSB. The music is in the purple handouts in the pews, along with some of the other responses that we will be using.

Occasionally I am asked why we sing so much during Mass... Mother Church continually reinforces the ideal of more singing and more sung prayer, especially through the lens of progressive solemnity. The more sacred or important a celebration is, the more of the parts of the Mass we should sing. But WHY!? The Church teaches that our prayer is more vibrant and highly exalted to God when the texts that we pray are sung. It helps us to lift our minds AND our hearts to the heavenly realm, to raise our intensity of prayer, and to join the angels and saints in heartfelt prayer and praise. Remember, singing is praying twice!

As we begin this Lent, let us dedicate ourselves to growing closer to God, to Jesus his Son, and to sharing our joy and love for God with others. A blessed Lent!

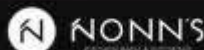
